


Ten Mile Basin Summit County, Colorado *Visually Important Lands Map*

Methodology: The observer points were derived using Summit County road centerline data and set every tenth of a mile on: I-70, State Highway 91 and 9, Frisco Main Street, Dillon Dam Road and Copper Road. The observer points were given a 4-foot offset from ground to represent the view from a car or standing. A 10M Digital Elevation Model was used in combination with the Division of Wildlife vegetation layer to develop a terrain model of the Basin. Using the observer points with the terrain model, the areas, which are visible from the observation points, were established. The visible areas are broken into 4 groups of nearly equal intervals to show levels of visibility. Areas that are not visible from observer points are also shown on this map.
